The second week of October for Silja Goetz Reader's DigestCome, if Staffan Normark, permanent secretary of the Royal Swedish Academy of Sciences, is even, will probably be the most important speech of your life. The first person to win a Nobel Prize in Africa was South African Max Theiler, who won the Nobel Prize in Physiology or Medicine in 1951. Six years later, the famous absurd philosopher and writer Albert Camus won the Nobel Prize in Literature. Camus was French and many people assumed he was born in France, but in fact the Frenchman was born, raised and trained in Algeria. Theiler and Camus emigrated from Africa at the awards ceremony, but made Albert Lutuli the first person to be awarded the Nobel Prize for his work completed in Africa. At the time, Lutuli (now born in South Rodesia, Zimbabwe) was president of the African National Congress in South Africa and was awarded the 1960 Nobel Peace Prize for running the non-violent campaign against Apartheid. Like Theiler and Camus, many African Nobel laureates have emigrated from their home countries and spent most of their working careers in Europe or the United States. As of 2014, an African Nobel Prize laureate who has won a Nobel Prize is not a Nobel Prize winner. (Award winners in the field of Peace and Literature are generally not affiliated with such institutions. Many of these areas resided in winning and were working in Africa during their awards.) This provides a clear example of the much discussed brain drain of men and women from Africa. Intellectuals with promising research careers often live and work in better-funded research institutions beyond the African coast. This is largely a matter of the strength of the economy and the reputation of institutions. Just ListenThis may seem illogical. When you're chatting with someone, it's usually back and forth. Moreover, one of the most important elements of privacy is that it helps to build and develop trust.
